Super Starfish

Is a Starfish a Fish?

Starfish are not fish because they do not have a backbone. They are part of a different group of animals. The octopus and the jellyfish are in this group too.



Where Do Starfish Live?

Starfish live in the sea. They can be found all around the world. They live in coral, pools in rocks and on the sea floor.

How Do Starfish Move?

Starfish have small feet on the bottom of their arms. These are called **tube feet**. They use their tube feet to slowly crawl along the floor because starfish cannot swim!

How Do Starfish Keep Safe?

Starfish are really good at keeping themselves safe. They have thick skin and it is very prickly. This makes them hard to eat. Some starfish can change colour so that they match what they are sitting on. This makes them hard to see.

Fun Facts!

- Starfish do not have blood and they do not have a brain.
- They have tiny eyes on the end of their arms.




A spelling scribe is where you draw a large squiggle on a piece of paper, making lots of different sections, and then write different spellings that you are practicing as many times as you can in each section.




Mission 2: Can you answer the subtraction equations below in numerals and words?

9-4=	15-3=	9-2=


Mission 3: Have a look at the bar chart below and answer the questions
